



2018 – 2019 Predoctoral Instructor Positions

Academic Student Employee (ASE) Open Hire Posting

The Nutritional Sciences Program within the School of Public Health (SPH) invites applications for 4 Predoctoral Instructor Positions during the winter 2019 and spring 2019 quarters. The application deadline is **Thursday, May 31**.

Winter 2019: From December 16, 2018 to March 15, 2019

1. **NUTR 200 Nutrition for Today** (4 credits) Examines the role of nutrition in health, wellness, and prevention of chronic disease. Topics include nutrients and nutritional needs across the lifespan, food safety, food security, wellness, body weight regulation, eating disorders, sports nutrition, and prevention of chronic disease.
2. **NUTR 402 Food Systems Modeling and Analysis** (5 credits) Provides a foundation in methods of modeling and analysis used to study food systems. Production, consumption, carrying capacity, food shed analyses, life cycle assessment, system dynamics, and integrated modeling will be addressed. Learn what types of questions are best addressed through modeling approaches, the methods used to conduct food systems models, and the data required to complete the analyses.

Spring 2019: From March 16, 2019 to June 15, 2019

3. **NUTR 200 Nutrition for Today** (4 credits) Examines the role of nutrition in health, wellness, and prevention of chronic disease. Topics include nutrients and nutritional needs across the lifespan, food safety, food security, wellness, body weight regulation, eating disorders, sports nutrition, and prevention of chronic disease.
4. **NUTR 536 Nutrition Education Principles and Practice** (2 credits) Examines theory-based design and delivery of nutrition education, including conducting needs assessments and developing lesson plans, activities, visual aids, and evaluation material. Explores design features of written, oral, and technology-based nutrition education materials and initiatives. Addresses differing learning styles, cultural groups, and literacy levels.

Duties

Predoctoral instructors are responsible for all aspects of planning for and teaching a course. Typical responsibilities include, but are not limited, to:

- Schedule and attend all course meetings and final exam
- Present lectures and facilitate discussion
- Hold regular office hours
- Prepare, maintain, and update CANVAS page as appropriate to the course
- Manage and respond to course-related email
- Respond to and return student work in a timely manner
- Consult with faculty supervisor, advisers, regarding course issues, as appropriate
- Prepare course plan and lectures
- Prepare syllabus, handouts, or review materials as appropriate
- Prepare exams, essays, or other assignments
- Evaluate students based on performance in the course
- Administer and grade assignments and exams
- Calculate quarter grades, maintain all grade records, and submit grades by the quarterly due date

- Administer course evaluations
- When applicable, supervise teaching assistants, readers / graders

Eligibility

- Graduate student with education and experience relative to course content.
- ASEs must be enrolled for at least 10 credits during quarter(s) of appointment.
- Those who are not a native speaker of English, must meet the Graduate School's spoken English proficiency requirements to hold an ASE position.
